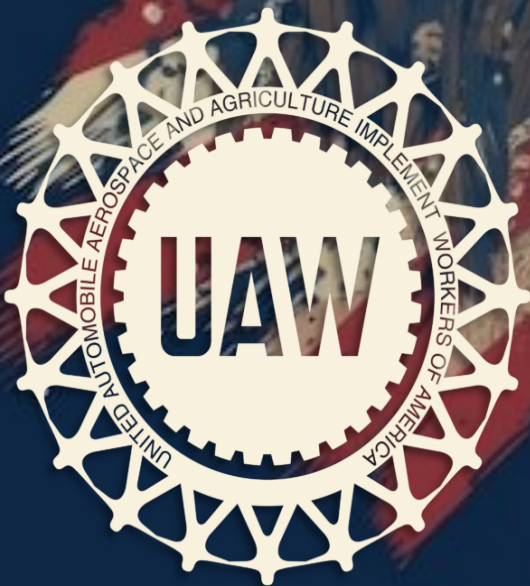

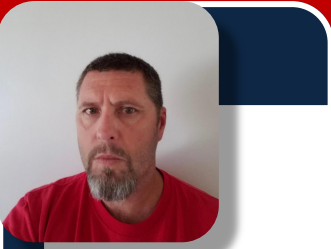

Greetings all,

I would like to thank the membership and the Executive board for allowing me to attend the 2024 retiree conference in Treasure Island, Florida on April 22nd through 26th. It was a great conference.

Assistant director of region 8, George Palmer, opened the conference and spoke briefly on the historic vote that happened on April 19, 2024, for Volkswagen. The Volkswagen employees voted by a margin of 73% to Unionize. He stated, "it proves what happens when people stand in Solidarity, when we stand together, no force is greater." He introduced region 8 director Tim Smith.

Director Smith talked about how the retirees are the backbone of our Union and thanked each retiree for what they do. He also spoke on the historic vote at Volkswagen and that they had a long road ahead of them. Next step at Volkswagen was to get an election committee in place, get a temporary bargaining committee in place, and then to start negotiating their 1st contract. After they negotiate, they will have an election for all elected positions.

He also spoke about organizing and that they are getting calls daily to organize and that we are not going to give up and will continue to organize.

Also, spoke on the upcoming Presidential election and how important it is to the Union and all the gains we have had over the past few years. "No other President has ever stood on the picket line with auto workers. President Biden stood with auto workers and supported our cause."

Again, I would like to thank the membership and the Executive board for allowing me to attend the retiree conference.

I have started working on retiree healthcare for 2025 but am in the early stages of getting information from the Company and do not have an update currently. I do not foresee making any changes to the non-Medicare plan for next year at this time but should have more information by the next retiree meeting in August. If we stay with the health reimbursement account, any retiree, spouse, or surviving spouse that are non-Medicare will have open enrollment again in November into December for their plan for 2025. I will have more updates on this in the coming months.

I have asked for numbers for the Medicare advantage plan, and I should have this information by the end of July, so I should have an update on the Medicare advantage plan cost for 2025 in August as well.

Greetings all,

As we reach the mid-point of the year, there have been many challenges with the implementation of the 6700 into production alongside of the legacy truck. We are still seeing a lot of parts issues that are causing delays with the builds and shipments. As we move forward we must continuously focus on safety, and the quality of the trucks we build.

So far this year, there are several issues that your Union Reps and I have had to address with the company, and here are just a few as we head into the later part of 2024: Issues over FMLA, S&A, Article 45-Attendance points, Article 40-Work standards, Article 15- Promotion and transfer, Article 34-Vacations, Article 3- Non-Discrimination, Article 19- Overtime, and several other articles.

Documentation

Make sure you document everything that involves your job, from missing parts, to work incomplete. Keep all records of your vacation and personal day sheets, and all call records to the plant. Keep all paperwork and emails to Alight and get an accurate record of your attendance points. If you put in a job bid or shift preference, see that your committeeperson has a copy also. I highly encourage each of you to contact HR and make sure All of your info is up to date. You can find their phone number and email contact information on Violin, have your supervisor get you that information, or simply stop by their office.

Management Misconduct

If something is said to you or anyone else by your supervisor, BTL, or any other member of management that is derogatory, maligning, or considered harassing in any way; record what was said, the time, day, and witnesses that were there. Make sure you keep a notebook, and everything is documented. Under Volvos Policy # WP03 "Harassment is defined as any unwelcome or unsolicited verbal, non-verbal, physical, or sexual conduct that creates an intimidating, hostile, or offensive working environment." There is a link on Violin on how to report Code of conduct violations of management.

What to do if you have a grievance?

If you have a grievance issue that the supervisor cannot resolve, have your supervisor contact your committeeperson immediately. If it still cannot be resolved, then it will get put in writing for you to sign. Your grievance will then follow the grievance procedures outlined in Article 6. Remember, documentation is a key aspect in resolving grievances.

Make sure you have a Prescription or Medical Card

Have you recently been prescribed pain medication or medical marijuana? Ask HR for a copy of the company's Policy WP-13 Substance Abuse Policy 01/01/2023. Read and understand its entirety. Take time to ensure your prescriptions and MM cards are up to date.

3rd Party Time Studies

The company is having a 3rd party do time studies for the new breakdowns involving the 6700. It is in everyone's best interest to maintain a steady performance without coming in early or working through your lunch or break periods. Communication with your off shift, and validating you are doing the exact same work, is key to making sure work standards are the same for both shifts. In the past the company has used shifts against each other, and that needs to stop. We have cycle times and line sets for a reason.

Work Keys and Caps Test

We recently had several openings that required passing scores on the Work Keys Test. The company offered the test in the latter part of April and asked to use the Union Hall because of the large class size. Most of these jobs are now filled. There will be another test offered around 6 months from the last date. Work keys are offered two times in a year. If you have taken the Work Keys Test, check with HR to make sure your test scores are on file. The following Jobs require a completion of the Work Keys Test: Facilitator, Hazmat, E-coat Tech, Waste Water, Robot Paint Operator, Automation Technician, and Trainer. The Caps test will not be offered until the first part of 2025. This is the test for the Skilled Trades Apprentice program. This test is only offered every two years.

Pay Raise

Effective July 1, 2024, all production and maintenance employees who were at the top pay rate the previous year, and skilled trades should have received a three percent (3%) general wage increase. Check your ADP account to make sure your pay is correct. If it is not, contact HR and let your committeeperson know.

Summertime is here and with that comes a much-needed break for many with the Summer Shutdown. I hope you have a safe and enjoyable time off, and may you make the most of your time with family and friends. Let us move forward when we return; revived and refreshed. It is extremely important that we all stay focused and continue to be our best, and to build the best truck possible here in the NRV.



GERRY HORGAN

1955-1989

In 1989, members of Communications Workers of America (CWA) Local 1400 were on strike against NYNEX in Valhalla, New York.

E. Gerald Horgan, a steward from CWA Local 1103, was walking the picket line with the strikers on August 15 when he was struck by a speeding vehicle driven by a scab.

Horgan died, leaving behind a wife and two very young children. We wear red to remember the tragedy and symbolize the sacrifice Gerry made that day to fight for worker rights.

RED SHIRT WEDNESDAY

Union members wear red shirts on Wednesdays as a sign of solidarity. When a sea of red shirts greets management, it's a way to let them know that the workers stand together.

This modern tradition goes back to 1989 with the Communications Workers of America (CWA) whose members began wearing red on Thursdays to commemorate the death of Gerry Horgan. Horgan was a CWA chief steward for Westchester County in New York who died of head injuries after being struck by a speeding car on a picket line. That vehicle was driven by a scab, the teenaged daughter of a

manager. She was never charged for his death.

Wearing the red shirt to show solidarity took on new meaning during Wisconsin's Gov. Scott Walker and his relentless attacks on labor in 2011. Unionists around the country wanted to show solidarity with Wisconsin and donned red shirts once a week.

Today, it remains an act of showing unity, both to one another and the world. It's not anti-management; it's a positive statement of workers standing together.

We will be doing the Making of Apple Butter Event on September 21st, and we are asking for the membership to come out and help. It will be an enjoyable time!

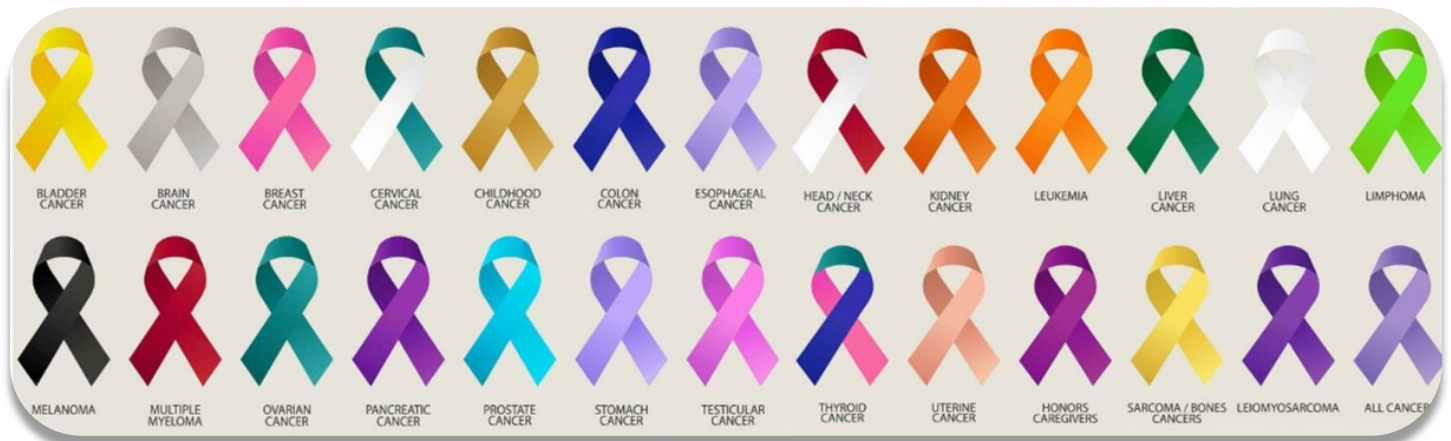
In October we will be doing a Jacket/Coat drive. If you wish to donate they can be new or used in good condition. Look out for more information in the coming months.

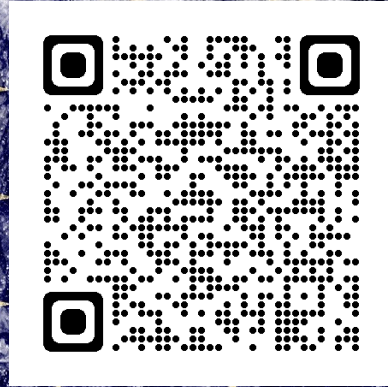
