As of the time of writing this article Mack and Volvo had reached an Impasse resulting in a forced vote on Wednesday November 15. Our hearts go out to our Mack Brothers and Sisters.

I would like to thank all our Standing Committee's for all the hard work and community outreach projects they have accomplished this year. Our Standing Committees have been remarkably busy and successful from our picnic, showing gratitude to our Veterans, raising money for the Cancer Society, making Our Daily Bread available, to projects to help our community's to making sure everyone is treated as fair as possible, I want to thank you. In closing, I hope everyone gets to enjoy the upcoming Holidays, Christmas, and New Years, and that you get to spend some much-needed time with friends and family and that the upcoming year will bring prosperity and stability to each of you!




Warmest wishes for a Happy Holiday Season to all the UAW members and UAW retirees of Local 2069.

A few Reminders for everyone to remember going into the New Year

If you must be out of work and need to file FMLA or S&A, make sure you have all paperwork and documentation filled out and sent to Alight. Also, make sure you call Alight at 866-305-6502 within 24 hours after you call in to the plant. Make sure you receive documentation that says you are "approved" for days off, and all time off is allocated for. Your paperwork may say eligible but that does not mean you are approved. Keep copies of all documentation. We have had numerous issues and even had some terminations over non-approvals and failures to submit proper documentation on time.

Make sure if you put in for vacation or personal days that you fill out the correct forms and your supervisor does their job and gives you a copy. Do not take the supervisor's word that you are approved. Always have documentation to back it up!

Be sure you are receiving the company text messages or phone calls in case of work stoppage, weather-related issues, or any other event that would affect production or work standards. Do not rely on Social Media Disinformation.

With the multitude of issues we have all had with third party payroll this year, make sure and keep a close watch on your pay from ADP. Double check your statements to make sure your pay, deductions, and your bank deposits are correct.

Have your supervisor check your points and do it often. If your vacation days, personal days, or your points are not coded right by your supervisor. It can cause issues like wrongful disciplines, loss of bid rights, and shift preference problems.

Should you have to call in for bereavement, make sure and state the relationship, and what days you are calling in for. Also, make sure you have documentation to verify in case HR questions your time off.

Be Aware, Volvo does monitor what you post on the internet. There have been posts that have gotten several employees disciplined and even terminated over content. A private group does not mean your pics or comments are private, people can take a screen shot and send it anywhere.

Do yourself a favor and "keep your crap off the app."

Make sure you are wearing all required PPE and are using it accordingly. Be aware of potential safety risk and alert your Supervisor, Committeeman, and Safety Representative if you feel something you are about to do will put you or someone else in danger. We have had several UAW brothers and sisters suffer major injuries this year due to unsafe practices and conditions.

Check your attitude and watch how you say things to other employees. Do not make threatening or verbal assaults towards anyone. Shop rule #45 "Creating a hostile work environment", it has been used on several employees that were terminated in the past year.

Remember, we are all held to a Code of Conduct that everyone has signed off on. Management is no exception.

We are each responsible for our own actions.

Vehicle Recommendations

One way to tell if you are buying a UAWmade vehicle is to consult the list on the opposite page. If it has an asterisk, you need to do a little detective work. The vehicle sticker will tell you the final assembly plant as well as the Vehicle Identification Number (VIN).

The UAW recommends buying certain Canadian-built vehicles because they are built by our brothers and sisters in Canada's Unifor union and have significant UAWmade content that supports the jobs of our brothers and sisters in transmission, foundry, stamping and parts plants. Those are listed

And just because a vehicle VIN starts with a 1, 2, 4, or 5, doesn't automatically mean it' a recommended buy. Vehicles not on the list that start with these numerals are made in nonunion plants.
